Hinulugang Taktak Protected Landscape (HTPL)

is one of the popular tourist destinations in Antipolo City, known for its waterfall situated near the Taktak Road, within Brgy. Dela Paz, and Brgy. Sta Cruz, Antipolo City.

The **Hinulugang Taktak Falls** is the original attraction of the park, and was visited by thousands of people to swim or bathe. Hinulugang Taktak plays a great role in Antipolo's natural and cultural heritage, and one of the most important landscapes in the Province of Rizal because of its history.

Taktak (or kampana, bell) may symbolize a call to action, which in


may symbolize a **call to action**, which in the HTPL's case, to call the attention of the public regarding an important matter, specifically, water pollution.


According to the legend, the local residents complained about the harsh loud sounds of the bell that rang during Angelus, and demanded the removal of the bell in the 16th century. The local priest then had to take the large bell and drop it to a nearby river. The word 'taktak' means 'kampana' or 'bell' in English, in which the name "Hinulugang Taktak" means "where the bell was dropped" literally. (Source: HTPL Management Plan 2022-2031)

Symbolic Capital Theory
